Fire Pits, Portable Outdoor Fireplaces, and Recreational Fires

The use of portable outdoor fireplaces. fire pits. Or chimeneas (recreational fires) are permissible within the Fairmount Fire Protection District if the following guidelines from the currently adopted International Fire Code are followed and there are no fire bans/restrictions in place by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office:

IFC (307.1.1) Prohibited Open Burning-

Open burning shall be prohibited when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous. Exception: Prescribed burning for the purpose of reducing the impact of wildland fire when authorized by the fire code official.

*** Burning of trash, garbage, construction debris and other man made materials is <u>NOT</u> permitted in Jefferson County. Any fire that is offensive or objectionable because of smoke emissions shall be extinguished.

IFC (307.3) Extinguishment Authority-

Where open burning creates or adds to a hazardous situation or required permit for open burning has not been obtained, the fire code official is authorized to order the extinguishment of the open burning operation.

IFC (307.4.2) Recreational Fires-

Recreational fires shall not be conducted within 25 feet of a structure or combustible material. Conditions which could cause a fire to spread within 25 feet of a structure shall be eliminated prior to ignition.

*** Recreational fires shall not exceed 3 feet in diameter and must remain 2 feet or less in height.

IFC (307.4.3) Portable Outdoor Fireplaces-

Portable outdoor fireplaces shall be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and shall not be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material. Exception: Portable outdoor fireplaces used at one and two- family dwellings

IFC (307.5) Attendance-

Open burning, bonfires, recreational fires, and the use of portable outdoor fireplaces shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. Not fewer than one portable fire extinguisher with a minimum 4-A rating or other approved on-site fire extinguishing equipment, such as dirt, sand, water barrel, garden hose or water truck shall be available for immediate utilization.

The Fairmount Fire Protection District, and the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department may implement Burn Restrictions at any time if atmospheric or environmental circumstances create the potential for hazardous fire conditions.

As of March 2017, the Fairmount Fire Protection District no longer issues Open Burning Permits. Open Burning Permits are required for irrigation ditch burns, agricultural burns, and bonfires.
